January Chapter 477 Meeting

Nick Ugolini never fails to deliver an interesting presentation! And his presentation at our January EAA 477 Chapter meeting was no exception. Nick showed us several examples of aircraft wiring systems documentation and discussed the pros and cons of documenting by breaking the diagrams into subsystems groups or going with a unified diagram approach.

One of the toys that Nick had on hand for us to see was a heat shrink tube printer that allows for labels to be professionally printed directly onto heat shrink tubing.



We also discussed several alternatives to buying a heat shrink printer that ranged from using a sharpie on clear write-on wraps to preprinted generic wiring labels.

A free tool that is available for creating wiring diagrams is a software package available from <http://pcb123.com/>. Originally designed to create printed circuit board, it is being used by aircraft builders to effectively design and document aircraft wiring systems.

Another of the toys Nick had on hand was a new light weight alternator with an integrated voltage regulator that is being used on one of his projects.

Keeping your mind In the Game

As Pilots we are constantly in learning mode, or at least we should be, but how many of us regularly utilize the vast Aviation resources available to us on the Internet? There are a myriad of FREE resources available to keep our minds In the Game on those rainy days or late evenings. I will only touch on a few in this article but will try and bring you more in future articles. I don't think it could be said any better than what Lorrie Sullenberger stated so eloquently about her husband, "He is the consummate pilot. He is about performing that airplane to the exact precision to which it is made." To operate at this level we must be fully committed to learning every aspect of our flying environment. The following are just a few of the tools available online to help us keep our mind in the game.

FAAST - Here pilots can participate in the WINGS Pilot Proficiency Program. There are hundreds of interactive courses available where you can focus learning on weak areas. You can even apply passed courses along with flying tasks flown with a CFI to obtain various levels of status including resetting your BFR date. faasafety.gov

Sportys FREE Study Buddy - An interactive Test prep program allowing you to create customized study sessions and randomly generated practice knowledge tests (Private, Instrument, and Commercial). I assume after passing an exam most of us never review or attempt to take the test material again. What a great way to test your retained knowledge and pick up on some of that lost knowledge. sportys.com/studybuddy

Exams 4 Pilots - Another great site that has all the various practical test including Sport Pilot, Private, Instrument, Commercial, Instructor, ATP, along with A & P Mechanics tests. exams4pilots.org

Aviation Safety is one of my favorite magazines and an outstanding source for straight forward in-depth analysis of accidents. Aviation Safety is a quick read without a bunch of fluff advertising: aviationsafetymagazine.com

AOPAs Flight Training site - An excellent resource for student pilots, with plenty of flight training resources, tips on flying lessons, information on flight tests, and more. Also very helpful for current and future CFIs. flighttraining.aopa.org/

Live ATC feeds - Again there are many live Air Traffic Control feeds you can listen too on the Internet which is another way to familiarize yourself with proper ATC communication terminology: liveatc.net

There are also blogs, twitter sites, and of course the most fun, face to face discussions with other pilots. Pilots are very astute and quick to analyze others unfortunate errors, noting we would never make that type of mistake ourselves. Don't discount these type of discussions as they can be extremely beneficial. Remember to seriously consider the various factors and acknowledge each one of us can make similar mistakes. One of my favorite quotes is: A superior pilot uses superior judgment to avoid those situations which require superior skill.

Safety Reminder - Fuel Vents

It is common practice to put protective covers on pitot tubes and various other areas to prevent 'critters' from nesting or building homes in our aircraft but it's not as common to put similar covers on fuel vent lines. Sure we check the vent lines visually during the preflight but how do you really know an insect hasn't built his house 3 or 4 inches up the vent line just out of sight? As we all know bugs are plentiful here in the south. Recently a Beech Baron landed in Charleston with a full fuel tank indication but upon closer inspection it was determined there was only 6 gallons of fuel in that tank. The fuel vent line was blocked, which created a vacuum strong enough to collapse the badder around the fuel probe, giving a 'full' fuel indication to the pilot. An inspection of the

fuel vent line found a mud dauber had decided the vent line was an excellent place to build his home, much to the distain of the pilot.

Prevention is the only way to assure those critters don't get in there in the first place. Using covers for pitot and fuel vents is vitally important, but remember to be darn sure and remove them. In the case of clogged fuel vents, the engine will likely run just long enough to put the aircraft in a very compromised position either during or just after takeoff.


